Elizabeth Shown Mills to Speak at 2011 KGS Seminar

The Kentucky Genealogical Society is pleased to announce the guest speaker for the 2011 Annual Seminar is the renowned genealogist and lecturer Elizabeth Shown Mills. The author of twelve books, Ms. Mills may best be known for essential titles Evidence! Citation and Analysis for the Family Historian (Baltimore: GPC, 1997) and Professional Genealogy: A Manual for Researchers, Writers, Editors Lecturers, and Librarians (Baltimore: PGC, 2001). Seminar attendees are certain to gain a higher knowledge of research as Ms. Mills has served on the faculty of Samford University Library's Institute since 1979, where she developed the groundbreaking Advanced Methodology Course.

The August meeting of the Society is traditionally held the first Saturday in August. At this meeting the KGS Annual Seminar is held and attracts a larger crowd than the Society's regular monthly Second Saturday workshops. The seminar is designed to attract well informed speakers to lecture on topics related to the field of genealogy, and which will assist the genealogist, professional and amateur, to become better researchers.

The seminar is planned for Saturday, 6 August 2011. Please note this is a first Saturday and not a second Saturday. Second Saturday – 12 February 2011 10:30 am - "Migration Patterns into Kentucky"

Don Rightmyer, editor of Kentucky Ancestors, will discuss the routes people took moving into Kentucky during the early settlement period, and the role migration played in the Commonwealth's early history.

12:30 pm - "Seduction, Deception & Enticement: Historical Déjà vu - The 'Old Court/New Court' Controversy in Kentucky"

Nearly 200 years ago, a financial crisis in Kentucky threatened to launch the state's own civil war, and the issues behind this controversy explain why many citizens of the time suffered significant reversals of fortune, moved away, and perhaps disappeared from the historical record. If terms such as "sound banking," "fiscal reorganization and stabilization," "tight credit" and "debt relief" sound familiar in 21st Century America, come join Lynne Hollingsworth of the Kentucky Historical Society Foundation as she describes how this crisis affected Kentuckians then and the lasting reverberations it continues to cause today.
