#### On The Road at NGS

What could be finer than Charleston, South Carolina in the spring? In 2011 certainly not much, especially if you are into genealogy!

As you probably know the National Genealogical Society held their 2011 Family History Conference the second week of May at the North Charleston Convention Center. The

South Carolina Genealogical Society hosted this year's event with over 200 individual seminars and luncheons held over the four-day period.

I started the week off by attending an extra day of skill building sessions presented by the BCG Education Fund on Tuesday. The all day event was comprised of two sessions flanking a luncheon. My morning session was "Working with Documents: From Discovery to What Comes Next" presented by Barbara Vines Little. In the afternoon I attended the session

on "In the Law Library: A Workshop on Legal Research for Genealogists" by Sharon Tate Moody.

The actual conference kicked off on Wednesday morning. Held in one of the large auditoriums the opening ceremony was worth getting out of bed for. If your last name is Gregory and you hope to definitively prove you are Clan MacGregor, you couldn't help but be moved

by the Charleston Police Pipe & Drums (http://www.charpol-pipesanddrums.com/). They were followed by the color guard, presentations of awards, special thanks to numerous volunteers, and the keynote speaker, Ms. Buzzy Jackson. While not a "professional" genealogist but rather a writer, Ms. Jackson spoke about writing her book Shaking the Family Tree: A Writer's Perspective on Turning Research Into Writing...

extremely entertaining.

I won't go into every session I attended but here are some of my more memorable lectures ... "Researching in Ireland: Planning is the Key to Success" by Eileen M. O'Duill; "Reporting the Facts: Record as You Go" by Pamela Boyer Sayre; and the Helen F.M. Leary Distinguished Lecture "The Genealogical Proof Standard: What It Is and What It Is Not" by Thomas W. Jones.

At one point in the week I ran into KGS Vice President Pat Layton, who was lucky enough to be able to combine her trip to

the conference with actual family research on her southeast relatives. Pat's favorite workshops at the conference were "Using Newspapers: using on line resources", "Photography: the Civil War and your Family Pictures", "Speaking from the grave: Exploring Probate Files" and "Blank or Prize: What you need to know about Georgia's Land Lottery". Pat pointed out Charleston is a great city! So much to learn - not enough time.

The Kentucky Genealogical Society is pleased to announce the guest speaker for the 2011 Annual Seminar is the renowned genealogist and lecturer Elizabeth Shown Mills. Ms. Mills will present four one-hour lectures:

## **Genealogical Problem Solving: Professional Techniques for Everyday Success**

Stuck on a line? Finding new books to buy is usually not the answer. Learning effective methodology for using common records and advanced techniques for finding elusive ancestors are the skills that separate the real genealogist from "name gatherers." This lecture covers 12 important success techniques to apply every day that you do research.

## Proving 'Oral History': How to Find the Truth about a Family Story

Handed-down stories usually contain a core of truth hidden within layers of confusion, pride, and fancy that have built up over time. How do we balance "tradition" against documentation to discover that core? This session provides a blueprint to follow, illustrated by actual cases.

## In a Rut? 7 Ways to Jump-Start Your Research

Stuck? It happens to everybody. So, how do really successful genealogists "prime their pumps" when their wells seem to go dry? This session offers both sources and methods to recharge your batteries when you think both you and your opportunities are totally exhausted.

## The Genealogical Proof Standard: How to Build a Case When No Record States the Answer

Genealogists may never find a document that says exactly what they hope to find. Yet it is still possible to build a convincing case—if one does it properly. This presentation shows how. It defines the standards, describes the research foundation necessary for a credible case, and details the manner in which an effective argument must be presented.

The author of 13 books, Ms. Mills may best be known for essential titles *Evidence!* Citation and

Analysis for the Family Historian (Baltimore: GPC, 1997) and Professional Genealogy: A Manual for Researchers, Writers, Editors Lecturers, and Librarians (Baltimore: PGC, 2001). Seminar attendees are certain to gain a higher knowledge of research as Ms. Mills has served on the faculty of Samford University Library's Institute since 1979, where she developed the groundbreaking Advanced Methodology Course.

Along with the four lectures will be two breaks for browsing the vendor's area and a lunch break featuring a deluxe box lunch included in the price.

Speaker: Deborah Campisano. Genealogical problems arise when historical records either do not exist, or do not directly support a clear conclusion. Learn about the accepted standards of evidence that must be met when trying to draw a conclusion, prove a relationship or, at the very least, discriminate between what information is credible and what is not. This session is intended as an introduction to the concept of GPS, and may be especially useful for those who want to explore it more fully in the following month's KGS Annual Seminar with Elizabeth Shown Mills.

## Louisville Genealogical Society (LGS) Family History Seminar & Book Fair

The 2011 Seminar will take place on 15 October and their speaker will be John T. Humphrey.

John T. Humphrey, CG, is recognized nationally and internationally for his contributions to German genealogy. In 2010 he was invited to give a presentation on researching Germans in America at Schloss Dhaun in the Rhineland Palatinate; in 2008, at the request of the German Embassy, he gave the keynote address at the

400th Anniversary Celebration commemorating four centuries of German immigration into the United States. He has appeared on national television and public radio.

Mr. Humphrey's research specialties include eighteenth-century Palatines, Pennsylvania and nineteenth-century Germans. He specializes in German research at the Library of Congress, the National Archives and record repositories in southeastern Pennsylvania. The Prussian State Library in Berlin, church archives in Boppard and Berlin, the Institut für pfälzische Geschichte und Volkskunde in Kaiserslautern, the Stadtarchiv in Hamburg, the Zentralarchiv der Evangelische Kirche der Pfalz in Speyer and the Landesarchiv in Darmstadt are among the locations where he has researched in Germany.

John Humphrey is the past president of the Mid-Atlantic Germanic Society, and a past vice president of the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania. He is the former director of the NGS Learning Center and author of numerous books including the sixteen-volume set of Pennsylvania Births listing over 200,000 births in fifteen eastern Pennsylvania counties and Understanding and Using Baptismal Records. His most recent publication is Finding Your German Ancestors: A Practical Guide for Genealogists.

Here are the topics that will be presented by John Humphrey at the 2011 LGS Seminar: 9:00 a.m. - Finding Your German Ancestor's Place of Origin

An interesting array of records exist that can lead you to your ancestral "heimat" in Germany. Learn what those records are and their uses.

10:45 a.m. - Using Church Records Effectively

Church records are one of the more important record groups genealogists use. To fully exploit these records family historians need to understand the history of record keeping and the traditions of the church where their ancestors worshipped.

1:15 p.m. - German Immigration, Migration and Settlement Patterns within the U. S.

The process of locating information on German ancestors is facilitated if genealogists searching for that family have some knowledge of that immigrant ancestor's port of entry as well the location where he/his family initially settled.

### 3:00 p.m. - Reconstructing Families on the Colonial Frontier

Records kept during the colonial period can be difficult to find, or when they do exist, they are often incomplete. This void or lack of information causes serious obstacles to research. This lecture explores strategies to get around those obstacles by creatively using data found in the records that do exist.
